The Ingenious Narrator of Poe's Dupin Mysteries

"Murders in the Rue Morgue," the narrator explains that because he is better off financially than Dupin, he is "permitted to be at the expense of renting, and furnishing in a style which suited the rather fantastic gloom of our common temper, a time-eaten and grotesque mansion" (532) The
